#### Merit Finalists Number 3.4% Of All Seniors

Three Wheatley seniors; Jeff-rey Fischman, Steve Nelson and Anita Silvers, have become finalists in the National Merit Scholarship Competition, it was announced Monday, February 24 by Dr. Boyan. This is 3.4 per cent of the senior class, seven times the national norm. of 0.5

The three finalists each re ceived a Certificate of Merit, which was awarded to 7,300 seniors across the country whose Scholastic Apptitude College Board marks confirmed their high scores on the Scholarship Qualifying Test, given on Tues-

Quantying Test, given on Tues-day, October 22.
Winners of Merit Scholarships will be notified confidentially about March 15, and public an-nouncement will be made about May 1. It is expected that about thousand scholarships will be awarded.

The complete list of Certifi-cate of Merit winners will be published about the middle of March and sent to all colleges. Many of the winners who do not win Merit Scholarships may be offered scholarship aid by

other groups.

According to John M. Stalnaker, president of the National Merit Scholarship Corporation, "The purpose of the National Scholarship Program is to locate the youth of the nation who can especially benefit from a college education and to help them to obtain this education. On the basis of our evidence, we are sure that—(the Certificate of Merit winners)—c; n profit from higher education."
